Dear friends,

It is impossible these days to have a big parish picnic without undertaking a risk management assessment. Thankfully, whomever was responsible for such things among the disciples of Jesus undertook their due diligence. They would have received a tick for: crowd control ("Make the people sit down"); and another tick for sustainability ("Pick up the pieces left over, so that nothing gets wasted"), and a final tick for their emergency assembly procedure (Jesus escaped back to the hills by himself). Work, Health and Safety would have be impressed.

Of course, Jesus wasn't following any safety check-list or risk assessment but, as always, Jesus was responding to the needs of the moment, regardless of the risk. Last week Jesus noticed that the crowds reminded him of "sheep without a shepherd" and today we see what this compassion looks like in practice. Jesus feeds the hungry crowd. Interestingly, Jesus doesn't turn this moment into some great theological statement or offer some spiritualised commentary. In fact, he deliberately avoids turning this grand feast into a coronation. He is firstly dealing with what people need at this moment. They need to be fed and he feeds

them. He addresses their physical hunger but any lessons can be learnt.

Jesus frequently seems to have an ambiguous relationship with crowds. Some times they are for him, some times against him but, more often than not, they misinterpret him. Jesus knows that they—the crowd—need some space to make sense of what they have experienced. They need to come to understand what it means to be filled by Jesus. Every parent who has heard the words, "But I'm still hungry!" would understand exactly where Jesus is coming from. Is it hunger that we feel or we just haven't registered that we have been filled?

Wanting more than our fill is often gluttony rather than hunger, and gluttony is not just about food. Recognising the ways in which Jesus fills us is how we make sense of the scraps. What we so regularly waste and leave aside in life is evidence of our disregard for the true gifts that are given us in abundance. Our selfinterested concern is usually an expression of our fear that we don't have enough for ourselves, let alone anyone else. It is our hoarding that creates scarcity. In reality, God can use even what we waste for our good and the good of others. *Fr. Anthony*



The Men's Catholic Rosary meets at 10:30am on the first Saturday of every month on the grassed area to the right of the Cathedral's main entrance.




Clergy Convocation 7 & 8 August


