A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Galatians

If you are guided by the Spirit you will be in no danger of yielding to self-indulgence, since self-indulgence is the opposite of the Spirit, the Spirit is totally against such a thing, and it is precisely because the two are so opposed that you do not always carry out your good intentions. If you are led by the Spirit, no law can touch you. When self-indulgence is at work the results are obvious: fornication, gross indecency and sexual irresponsibility; idolatry and sorcery; feuds and wrangling, jealousy, bad temper and quarrels; disagreements, factions, envy; drunkenness, orgies and similar things. I warn you now, as I warned you before: those who behave like this will not inherit the kingdom of God. What the Spirit brings is very different: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, trustfulness, gentleness and self-control. There can be no law against things like that, of course. You cannot belong to Christ Jesus unless you crucify all self-indulgent passions and desire.

Since the Spirit is our life, let us be directed by the Spirit.





150 Years of St Stephen's Cathedral

- Visit of John Bede Polding OSB, Archbishop of Sydney.
 An Aboriginal mission is established at Dunwich,
 Stradbroke Island.
- 1843 James Hanly, first parish priest, arrives in December.
- 1845 Land granted for a Roman Catholic Church, School and Parsonage.
- St Stephen's Church work begins.
 Work began on this little stone church in November 1848, using a design of Gothic revival architecture attributed to Augustus Welby Northmore Pugin.
- 1850 St Stephen's Church first Mass.Fr James Hanly celebrates the first Mass in the church on12 May 1850 when there were just sixty Catholic familiesin town.
- IN 1859 Brisbane becomes a Diocese.

 In 1859, with the appointment of Bishop James Quinn, Brisbane becomes a diocese and the church a cathedral.
- St Stephen's Cathedral foundation stone.

 Bishop Quinn, the first bishop of the diocese, lays the foundation stone of the new cathedral on the feast of St Stephen. A larger and more ornate church was envisaged than the present one but the economic depression of the mid-186os resulted in only part of the original foundations being laid.
- 1869 St Mary MacKillop arrives to work in Brisbane.
- 1874 St Stephen's Cathedral is solemnly blessed and opened.
 On Sunday, 17 May 1874, the still incomplete cathedral was solemnly blessed and opened. It covered about a third of the area of the one first planned.

- 1882 Bishop Robert Dunne is appointed second Bishop of Brisbane.
- St Stephen's Cathedral facade is completed.

 During the time of Bishop Dunne, the top of the gable and the spires are added to the Elizabeth Street facade in 1884.

 Next the cathedral is enriched with stained glass and marble.
- Brisbane is elevated to a Metropolitan See.Bishop Dunne is appointed the first Archbishop of Brisbane.
- 1912 Bishop James Duhig of Rockhampton appointed Coadjutor Bishop of Brisbane.
- 1917 Archbishop Duhig is appointed the second Archbishop of Brisbane following death of Archbishop Dunne on 13 January 1917.
- 1920 St Stephen's Cathedral transepts.On 3 October 1920, Archbishop Duhig lays the foundation stone of new transepts.
- 1922 St Stephen's Cathedral transepts are completed. On 2 April 1922, the transepts are blessed and opened.
- 1948 Fr Patrick O'Donnell is appointed Coadjutor Bishop of Brisbane on 8 November 1948.
- 1965 Archbishop Duhig dies and Archbishop O'Donnell becomes the third Archbishop of Brisbane on 10 April 1965.
- 1973 Archbishop O'Donnell resigns after turning 75 years.

 Archbishop Francis Rush is appointed the fifth bishop and fourth Archbishop of Brisbane and installed on 29 May 1973.
- 1980 St Stephen's Cathedral Renovation.

 Archbishop Francis Rush undertakes the complete renovation and extension of the Cathedral during the 1980s.
- 1989 Dedication of the Cathedral.On 4 December 1989, Archbishop Rush dedicates the Cathedral of St Stephen.

- 1991 Archbishop Rush resigns after turning 75 years and Bishop John Bathersby of Cairns is appointed fifth Archbishop of Brisbane on the 3 December 1991 and installed on 30 January 1992.
- 1999 St Stephen's Chapel is restored.

 Archbishop Bathersby solemnly dedicates the restored
 St Stephen's Chapel on 5 February 1999.
- 2000 Cathedral of St Stephen Organ.Archbishop Bathersby blesses the Jubilee Pipe Organ on29 October 2000.
- 2010 Mary MacKillop is proclaimed Saint by Pope John Paul II in Rome on 17 October.
- 2011 Archbishop Bathersby resigns after turning 75 years.
- 2012 Archbishop Mark Coleridge is appointed sixth Archbishop of Brisbane on 2 April 2012 and installed on 11 May 2012.
- 2017 Blessed Sacrament Chapel.
 Following the installation of a new tabernacle and artwork,
 Archbishop Coleridge blesses the refurbished Blessed
 Sacrament Chapel
- 2018 Shrine to St Mary of the Cross MacKillop.
 On 21 October, Archbishop Coleridge blesses the shrine to St
 Mary of the Cross MacKillop and entrustes all victims and
 survivors of sexual abuse to her intercession
- 2024 On 17 May, the 150th Anniversary of the Opening and Blessing of the Cathedral is celebrated.

Archbishops of Brisbane



Bishop James O'Quinn

- Consecrated Bishop of Brisbane 29th June 1859.
- Was the first Bishop of the newly created Diocese of Brisbane.
- Bishop Quinn brought with him priests and Sisters of Mercy, who established themselves immediately in the Diocese.
- In 1875 Bishop Quinn changed his name to O'Quinn to honour the great Irish 'liberator' Daniel O'Connell.
- Bishop O'Quinn was the driving force behind the construction of St Stephen's Cathedral, which was officially opened in 1874.
- He attended the First Vatican Council in Rome in 1869.
- Bishop O'Quinn knew and had a somewhat fractured relationship with Mary Mackillop.
- Bishop O'Quinn died on 18th August 1881 and is buried in the Cathedral crypt.



Archbishop Robert Dunne

- Robert Dunne became the Bishop of Brisbane 18th June 1882.
- The Diocese was elevated to that of an Archdiocese, and Dunne became the first Archbishop of Brisbane 13th May 1887.
- Archbishop Dunne was known as being primarily focused on pastoral engagement and was regarded very fondly by the people of Brisbane, preferring to be called 'Father' rather than 'Your Grace'.
- He was known for showing compassion and outreach to all, especially those in the more rural parts of the Archdiocese.
- He moved into the renovated residence of 'Dara' in 1891.
- During the 1890s Archbishop Dunne had a passion for education. Many schools were established during this time, including Nudgee College, and Archbishop Dunne was a vital force in the creation of a State University, the University of Queensland opening in 1910.
- Through his encouragement of Irish land settlement and education, an emerging Catholic middle class arose during Dunne's time as Archbishop.
- He died on 13th January 1917 and is buried in the Cathedral crypt.



Archbishop James Duhig

- James Duhig became Archbishop of Brisbane on 13th January 1917, after spending time previously as Co-adjutor Archbishop of Brisbane, assisting Archbishop Dunne who was elderly and infirm.
- He is Brisbane's longest serving Archbishop, his episcopate lasting until 1965.
- Archbishop Duhig is a seminal figure in the Archdiocese of Brisbane, his building projects have become somewhat legendary, and he is often referred to as 'James the Builder'.
- He was responsible for the building and setting up of hundreds of parishes, schools, and religious orders in Brisbane.
- Archbishop Duhig felt that St Stephen's Cathedral was too small for his growing Archdiocese and so formulated a vision to create the Holy Name Cathedral, opposite All Hallows School, on the land that the Archbishop's residence 'Dara' was on, a house he proceeded to have torn down to make way for the new Cathedral. The Cathedral was never completed.
- Archbishop Duhig saw the Brisbane Archdiocese through the end of the First World War, the Depression, and the entirety of the Second World War.
- He was a keen supporter of immigrants, especially the Italian community.
- James Duhig was knighted in 1959.
- The Second Vatican Council occurred towards the end of his life, and while he was of another era, he left the way open for change.
- Archbishop James Duhig died on 10th April 1965, and is buried in the Cathedral crypt.



Archbishop Patrick O'Donnell

- Patrick O'Donnell became Archbishop of Brisbane immediately upon Archbishop Duhig's death, as he had been Coadjutor Archbishop of Brisbane, with the right of succession, since 1948.
- He was well known to the Archdiocese as a result, and known as 'Paddy' to many.
- From 1962 to 1965 Archbishop O'Donnell attended each of the sessions of the Second Vatican Council, and he was responsible for the implementation of the many changes that followed.
- He took up residence of a home called 'Glengariff' in 1949, donated by the prominent Byrne family. Rather than moving into 'Wynberg' after Duhig's death, now known as the Archbishop's residence, he stayed at 'Glengariff' for the rest of his life.
- He was responsible for moving the Archdiocesan administration into the Cathedral precinct.
- He increased the role of the laity within the Archdiocese and their participation on boards and councils.
- He was a great supporter of the Catholic Colleges at the University of Queensland and oversaw extensions to the Seminary at Banyo.
- He was required to submit his resignation, as was now the rule, at the age of 75 in 1972. He retired as Archbishop in March 1973.
- After a retirement that he is said to have enjoyed greatly, Archbishop O'Donnell died on All Souls Day 1980. He is buried in the Cathedral crypt.



Archbishop Francis Rush

- Archbishop Francis Rush was consecrated Archbishop of Brisbane on 5th March 1973.
- Archbishop Rush was a much-loved leader of the Archdiocese, with Bishop Gerry describing him as, "...the greatest man I have known personally, and, for many more than myself, one of the kindest".
- He was serving as Bishop of Rockhampton during the Second Vatican Council between 1962 and 1965 and was lauded for how he shepherded his Diocese through the resulting changes.
- He was a devoted supporter of 'Vatican II' and encouraged his priests to adhere to its principles. Inspired by this council, he also oversaw a renewal of religious orders in the Archdiocese.
- Archbishop Rush fought for social justice, especially within the first
 nations communities. He did so, often, with the help of clergy from
 other denominations. Indeed, ecumenism was a passion of his,
 culminating in his leading all the Dioceses in the Catholic Province of
 Queensland in joining Queensland Churches Together.
- At the age of 75 he offered his resignation to the Pope and he retired in 1991.
- Archbishop Francis Rush died on 21st July 2001. He is buried in the Cathedral crypt.



Archbishop John Bathersby

- Archbishop John Bathersby was consecrated on 30th January 1992.
- From the onset of his episcopate, he stated that his major focus would be the subjects of spirituality, ecumenism, and social justice.
- Archbishop Bathersby was a devoted supporter of various ecumenical organisations, both locally and internationally, between Roman Catholics and Anglicans, Roman Catholics and the Uniting Church, and President of the National Council of Churches in Australia.
- He served as the Chairman of the Bishops' Committee for Justice, Development, Ecology, and Peace from 2000-2006.
- Archbishop Bathersby was a keen supporter and promoter of the hugely successful World Youth Day that took place in Australia in 2008.
- Growing up in Stanthorpe, Archbishop Bathersby was an avid mountain climber and bushwalker, often officiating at a mass after a gruelling walk high in the hinterlands.
- He completed a doctorate in Rome and was for some time the Spiritual Director at the Seminary at Banyo.
- Archbishop Bathersby retired on 14th November 2011.
- He died on 9th March 2020 and is buried in the Cathedral crypt.



Archbishop Mark Coleridge

- Archbishop Mark Coleridge was consecrated as Archbishop of Brisbane on 11th May 2012.
- Archbishop Coleridge has spent time in Rome both as a student doing Doctoral studies in Sacred Scripture, and working for the Vatican Secretary of State.
- Consecrated as an Auxiliary Bishop in Melbourne, he was appointed the Archbishop of Canberra and Goulburn in 2006, before being announced as the next Metropolitan Archbishop of Brisbane in April 2012.
- Archbishop Coleridge led the Archdiocese through the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse (2013-2017), the coronavirus pandemic (2020-2021) and the Fifth Plenary Council (2021-2022).
- Archbishop Coleridge was twice elected President of the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference (2018-2022)
- Archbishop Coleridge called a diocesan synod in 2024.
- Archbishop Coleridge is known for his oratory as a teacher and preacher.

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
